The 2024-2025 Firsts Basketball season was Trinity's most successful in a long time. The team finished the regular season undefeated—with seven wins and one draw—securing a commanding first position on the ladder. A home semi-final was earned, setting up a rematch with Camberwell, a team the boys had previously defeated. Tragedy struck when star player Jack Bryan dislocated his knee just a week before the match. Yet, determined to battle on—and to Camberwell's deep horror—he stepped onto the court. Unfortunately, within the first few minutes, his knee gave way once again. In a ferocious clash, the T's fought to the final whistle but ultimately fell short by a very narrow margin to the reigning AGSV premiers. Yet, this heartbreaking defeat didn't take away from the team's spirit. Keen to move on from the loss, more than half the squad threw on their suits, fixed their hair, and headed straight to the Ruyton formal. Markus and Cooper stole the show, sweeping the awards ceremony, taking out best Couple in Year 11 and Year 12, respectively. Credit is due to the dedicated coaches, Mr. Dimattina and Jen, and the players for building a team chemistry that was second to none—one that ignited the Trinity spirit. Week after week, they turned Friday nights into a spectacle, bringing the school together and leaving a lasting mark on what was truly a season to remember.

The season was filled with standout moments, starting with our undefeated run in the preseason tournament at Yarra Valley Grammar. We finished with a dramatic draw against Peninsula after they sank a buzzer-beater, but the tournament proved invaluable in building camaraderie and team chemistry. The likes of Jake Witowski, Max Pavey, and Cooper Percy showcased their shooting prowess throughout the competition, setting the tone for what was to come. We opened the season in dominant fashion, securing back-to-back victories by 54 and 47 points, with unselfish ball movement leading to balanced scoring across the team—continuing the form we built in the preseason. A major highlight was the first inaugural Trinity vs. Marcellin

Basketball Cup, where we claimed victory thanks to Jake's incredible sixthree-pointer performance. Always a good feeling to take down Marcellin. A hard-fought away win against Assumption followed, leading us into the highly anticipated first-place showdown against Yarra. Though the game ended in a draw, our depth was on full display, with Liam "Slav" Slaviero Pascoe, John "Biggest Arms in AGSV" Hargrove, and Archer "Slim Reaper" Donaldson proving why we were a force to be reckoned with. In the final round of the regular season against Mentone, we built a massive lead, setting the stage for a special moment. After some persuasion from the crowd, training player Lachie Craik finally suited up for his first game. Despite air-balling his first two shots, fate had its way—his last attempt swished through, capping off the season in style. A huge thank you to my co-captain, John, for being by my side every step of the way, and to our coaches, Jen and Mr Dimattina, for their quidance.
