This year, the Trinity Fencing team enjoyed one of its strongest seasons on record. From the earliest individual rounds, our fencers consistently secured podium finishes. In the team events, Trinity claimed every gold medal in both Junior and Senior divisions, along with numerous silver and bronze placings. To wear the First XVIII jumper is aspirational for many school footballers. To play for Trinity Grammar School and share in the story of 123 years of football history, is an honour and a privilege.

Preseason commenced numbering 48 students across Years 10 – 12, seeking to create their own slice of the TGS footy story for season 2025. We welcomed Tarkyn Lockyer to the role of Head Coach, creating a sense of excitement and anticipation amongst the team. A successful footy camp, combining footy, golf, go karting, a student and parent team dinner and a practice match against Geelong Grammar, set the team on a confident path heading into the season.

We announced our leadership team, with Vice Captains, Flynn McNamara, Nikki du Toit and Will Collinson supporting the Captain, Mackie Martin. They proved to be wonderful appointments. Invested, passionate and inspirational.

A round one win against Assumption on the eve of Anzac Day was a fantastic start to the season, with 10 students making their First XVII debut. Confident was high heading into round two against PEGS. Alas, the team came up short and it felt this loss would be tough to overcome. The following round we found ourselves against Ivanhoe, and while the ball lived in our forward 50 for much of the second half, a slow start left our T Boys chasing a margin that they could not overcome. Both PEGS and Ivanhoe would go on to play in the AGSV Grand Final, and while we proved we could compete with the best, those losses defined our season. We won against every team below us but couldn't get the win over those above us – finishing 5th, just outside the final four. There were some wonderful moments in the season, none more so than an

electrifying burst of footy at the start of the second quarter against Camberwell. As quoted in the T Boys newsletter, following a poor first quarter.

"What followed was the most devastating burst of exciting football the Trinity side has produced all season. A goal within 30 seconds from Flynn McNamara was backed up by unrelenting pressure that led to a Harris goal with a good crumb right on the goal line. A second McNamara goal, with a check side across the body, and within 5 minutes, the deficit had been erased. The team were not done there. From the restart, in one of the individual plays of the season, Mackie Martin won possession from a Donaldson handball just rear of the centre circle, evaded one opponent, took a bounce, accelerated away and from 50m kicked his side's fourth goal in less than 6 minutes of second quarter play. It was, indeed, exhilarating stuff".

We congratulate to Mackie Martin, John Hargrove and Markus Nevasalo for their selection in the AGSV Rep Team. In their match against APS, the team went down by a single point in high standard affair. Congratulations also to Flynn McNamara and Will Johnson who were selected for the squad but unable to play due to their Coates League commitments.

A big thank you to all that make it possible for the team to pursue their footy passions each week, particularly our Sports team, Brendan Mahony, Belinda Bryan and Tina Hardner, the Grounds and Maintenance team who produce such splendid surfaces for our teams and our school nurses for tending to bruised and battered bodies. To the families who support their sons with travel, volunteer roles and the hugely popular Thursday night dinners, we thank you.

To Tarkyn for his dedicated work with the team, to assistants Mat Vacirca and Sam Phillips, who both combined their own playing commitments and to Charlie's Comer and Wenn for their training and match day support. Your passion and expertise are valued so highly.

If success is measured purely by the final ladder placing, then perhaps the season can be considered to have come up short. Alternatively, if you look at growth, connection, enjoyment and buy in for the joy of playing for Trinity and each other, then undoubtedly season 2025 has been a year that we can look back upon with pride.
